Judge Sara Hinchey of Ballarat, was announced as the new state coroner in December, 2015 for Victoria six months after her appointment to the County Court bench. As a former barrister she has appeared before a royal commission and also before the Coroner's Court as counsel assisting the coroner.

Some of the cases were the Kerang Rail Disaster, the Broughton Nursing Home deaths and the fatalities in the Burnley Tunnel.

Judge Hinchey will outline the role of the Coroner in the community of Victoria, and explain how the system works.

The Coroner has a particularly important task investigating specific reportable deaths and fires.

2017 Oration

The Hon. Tim Fischer AC presented the 2017 Oration on October 10th at Federation University Australia, entitled:

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO, WHO WON WW1?

Arthur Currie and the CEF,

John Monash and the all volunteer AIF,

Munitions Minister Churchill and the new tanks, but not so much the late on parade Yanks.

Mr Fischer suggested eight key people (plus one) had played a part in bringing World War 1 to an end. Each individual's contribution was described. He suggested that the Americans were not the prime factor, coming in towards the end. He focussed on the nine key individuals. Included in the presentation was a brief biography of Sir John Monash and the argument for his posthumous elevation to Field Marshall.

One hundred years ago Albert Coates was surviving the dangers of WW1 wanting to get back home to focus on studying medicine. He was present at Gallipoli and served at the front in France. He had been able to gain experiences and knowledge through his roles as a stretcher bearer, a medical orderly and an AMC orderly. He sent for books which would aid his medical career and seized moments to learn, such as attending Berlitz language classes when in Egypt in 1916.

During 1918, Coates was concerned that the protracted war could thwart his medical ambitions. He thought about options to study medicine in London or Edinburgh. He also considered his options as an interpreter, having developed strong skills in five languages, talents used to good effect in intelligence gathering in the last year of the war.

He was at sea when the armistice was signed on November 11th. He was not demobbed until February 1919, causing frustration at wanting to get on with pursuing his life's main goal in medicine.

About the Albert Coates Memorial Trust

The Albert Coates Memorial Trust is a volunteer-run organisation which raises funds to present scholarships for regional students in the areas of nursing, paramedicine and medicine. Albert Coates was born in Ballarat attending Mount Pleasant P.S. where four awards are offered. During WW2 Coates was a surgeon on the Thai-Burma railway, saving many lives.

VALE DAVID MANNING late RAN PM3925

Trust members and supporters have been saddened by the death of David Manning. David survived the sinking of HMAS Perth in March, 1941, becoming a prisoner of war. David knew 'Bertie' Coates on the Thai-Burma Railway, witnessed the work he did and saw the high regard in which Coates was held by fellow prisoners.



David made a remarkable contribution in the early days of fund raising for the Trust, speaking at several dinners and other functions. David's calm, but powerful delivery kept everyone spellbound, conveying how important Coates had been to the prisoners of war in his charge.

David and Audrey Manning were regular donors to the Trust throughout its history and both attended most of the events over the years. David will be much missed and our thoughts are with Audrey and the family.

Funding the Scholarships

The Coates Trust scholarship programme relies on individual donations and income derived from a dedicated fund managed through the Victorian Veterans' Council (VVC) and the Department of Premier and Cabinet. These funds are there to support former service personnel and their extended families.

In 2009, the Australian Legion of Ex-Service Men and Women committed a significant portion of its funds for the Coates Trust with the interest being used to support the Rural Nursing scholarships and other medical and nursing related awards.

The Trust works in cooperation with the VVC and the Veterans Affairs staff in the Premier's Department ensuring the programme is monitored effectively and runs smoothly.
